To truly appreciate the depth of this series, you must start at the beginning.

WHY READING SEQUENCE MATTERS FOR THE REBUS SERIES

Unlike many procedural series where each book exists in a vacuum, the Rebus series is a continuous story. Ian Rankin himself has stated that he did not initially plan for the series to stretch over so many years. As the books progressed, the character aged in real time. This means that Rebus gets older, his body aches more, his worldview shifts, and the world around him changes irreversibly. If you pick up a later novel, such as "Exit Music," you will be dropped into a story that carries the weight of twenty years of personal history, failed relationships, and professional grudges. The emotional payoff of the later books is exponentially higher when you have walked the beat with Rebus from his first case.

Furthermore, the supporting cast grows and recedes in specific patterns. Characters like Detective Siobhan Clarke, Rebus's superior and nemesis Chief Superintendent Gill Templer, and the infamous crime lord "Big Ger" Cafferty all have arcs that span multiple books. Reading the Rebus novels in order is the only way to understand the complex dance of loyalty, hatred, and grudging respect that defines these relationships. It is a journey well worth taking.

THE COMPLETE LIST OF REBUS NOVELS IN ORDER

Below is the definitive list of the main Inspector Rebus novels, presented in publication order. This is widely considered the best way to read the series, as it aligns with the character's chronological aging and the real-world evolution of the setting.

The Early Years: Establishing the Character

The first few novels introduce us to John Rebus as a Detective Sergeant. He is younger, more volatile, and still nursing the wounds of a failed marriage and his experiences in the British Army. These books have a raw, gritty energy that sets the tone for the entire series.

- Knots and Crosses (1987)** - The novel that started it all. Rebus is working in Edinburgh's "Summerhall" police station, a shadow of his future self. He is haunted by his past and by a series of kidnappings involving young girls. The book introduces the recurring themes of memory, guilt, and the hidden darkness beneath Edinburgh's respectable surface.
- Hide and Seek (1990)** - A seemingly straightforward drug overdose death of a young man leads Rebus into the dangerous world of Edinburgh's elite. This novel expands the social scope of the series, showing that crime is not limited to the city's poorer quarters.
- Tooth and Nail (1992)** - Originally titled "Wolfman" in the UK, this book sends Rebus to London to help with a serial killer investigation. It is a fascinating look at Rebus outside his natural habitat, highlighting how integral Edinburgh is to his identity. Reading the Rebus novels in order shows how he develops his unique investigative style here.
- Strip Jack (1992)** - The personal and professional collide when a respected MP is caught in a scandal. Rebus must navigate the murky waters of politics and personal reputation. This book deepens the world-building around Rebus's colleagues.
- Let It Bleed (1995)** - A turning point in the early series. Following a suicide and a jailbreak, Rebus finds himself up against the system more than ever. This is a bridge novel, moving him from the early, more chaotic stories toward the more structured political thrillers of the mid-series.

The Golden Era: Peak Rebus

This period is widely considered the strongest in the series. Ian Rankin hit his stride, weaving complex plots with deep social commentary. Rebus is fully formed as a character—cynical, brilliant, and self-destructive. These are essential reads for anyone looking to understand why the series is so critically acclaimed.

- Black and Blue (1997)** - Often cited as the masterpiece of the series. Rebus is investigating a copycat killer who is mimicking the crimes of a serial killer from the 1960s (Bible John). The book is a brilliant meditation on fame, justice, and the erosion of old certainties. It won the Gold Dagger Award for Best Crime Novel of the Year.
- The Hanging Garden (1998)** - Rebus is caught between a war between a Russian mobster and "Big Ger" Cafferty, all while dealing with a human trafficking case. This novel introduces the character of the crime lord Cafferty in a major way, setting up a rivalry that will define the rest of the series.
- Dead Souls (1999)** - A deeply personal and atmospheric novel. A serial killer from Rebus's past returns to Edinburgh, forcing him to confront old ghosts. The title, borrowed from Dostoyevsky, reflects the moral decay Rebus sees around him. Reading the Rebus novels in order makes the emotional weight of this book much heavier.
- Set in Darkness (2000)** - As the new Scottish Parliament is being built, a body is found in the foundations. This is a rich political thriller that explores the hopes and disappointments of Scottish devolution.
- The Falls (2001)** - A trip for a missing student leads Rebus into the world of the "Messenger of the Gods," a figure from an internet game. This book is notable for its exploration of new technology and its clash with Rebus's old-school methods.

The Final Cases: The Long Goodbye

As Rebus approaches retirement, the tone of the series becomes more melancholy and reflective. The pace is still thrilling, but there is a sense of an ending approaching. The character is forced to reckon with his legacy and the price he has paid for his obsession with justice.

- Resurrection Men (2002)** - Rebus is sent to a "retraining" course for difficult officers, only to find himself investigating an old murder case. This is a powerful story about police corruption and the secrets that police officers keep from one another.
- A Question of Blood (2003)** - A shooting at a private school leaves two boys dead and a former soldier missing. Rebus becomes obsessed with the case, even as his personal life implodes. The title refers to the biological evidence, but also to the "blood" of family and heritage.
- Fleshmarket Close (2004)** - A controversial and powerful novel dealing with the issue of asylum seekers and the exploitation of illegal immigrants in Scotland. Rankin uses the crime genre to tackle a major social issue with nuance and anger.
- The Naming of the Dead (2006)** - Set during the week of the G8 summit in Edinburgh, this book interweaves a series of mysterious deaths with the political protests happening in the city. It is a massive, ambitious novel that feels like a summation of the series' themes.
- Exit Music (2007)** - The final novel of the main series (for a long time). Rebus is days away from retirement when he is drawn into the murder of a Russian dissident. This book provides a powerful, emotional, and fitting conclusion to Rebus's career as a police officer. It wraps up major storylines, particularly the long-running war with Cafferty.

The Later Years: Retired, But Not Retired

Ian Rankin couldn't stay away from his most famous creation forever. A few years after "Exit Music," he brought Rebus back, no longer a policeman but still entangled in the world of crime. These books are no longer procedurals; they are cold war thrillers and private investigator stories featuring an aging, stubborn man who refuses to fade away.

- Standing in Another Man's Grave (2012)** - Now technically retired and working as a civilian in the police archives, Rebus stumbles onto the case of a serial killer operating on the roads in and out of Scotland. This book marks the beginning of a new phase for the character, showing that his instincts are as sharp as ever.
- Saints of the Shadow Bible (2013)** - Rebus continues to work cold cases while also consulting on a current murder. This novel heavily features Detective Siobhan Clarke, now a full DI, and explores the tension between the old ways and the new.
- Even Dogs in the Wild (2015)** - A powerful novel that sees Rebus, Clarke, and the retired gangster Cafferty working together, however reluctantly, to stop a killer targeting Edinburgh's elite. It is a masterclass in character dynamics.
- Rather Be the Devil (2016)** - Rebus delves into a cold case involving a wealthy businessman from the 1970s. The title references the famous Miles Davis track, and the novel has a jazz-like, improvisational feel. It also sees Rebus facing his own mortality more directly than ever.

In a House of Lies (2018) - A cold case involving a missing private investigator from a decade ago resurfaces when a body is found. The novel is a deep dive into the lies we tell ourselves and the secrets families keep.

A Song for the Dark Times (2020) - A deeply personal entry. Rebus’s daughter, Samantha, calls him for help when her partner goes missing in a remote part of Scotland. This book explores the fractured relationship between father and daughter in a way the series has never done before.

Heart Full of Headstones (2022) - Rebus finds himself in an unofficial investigation that reaches back into the darkest days of his own career in the 1990s. This book is a reckoning with the past, asking whether the ends ever truly justify the means.

Midnight and Blue (2024) - The latest novel in the series. It places Rebus in a high-security prison, investigating a murder from the inside. It is a claustrophobic, tense thriller that pushed the character into entirely new territory.

THE BEST ENTRY POINTS FOR NEW READERS

If looking at this list feels daunting, there are a few natural places to start. While starting with **Knots and Crosses** is the purest way to read the Rebus novels in order, some readers find the early books a bit dated. A common recommendation is to start with **Black and Blue** or **The Hanging Garden**. These books represent the series at its peak and provide enough context to understand the world, while still being excellent mysteries. You can always go back and read the earlier ones later for the backstory. However, if you are committed to the full emotional journey, start at the very beginning and enjoy the slow burn.

THE SHORT STORIES AND NOVELLAS

In addition to the full-length novels, Ian Rankin has written several short stories featuring John Rebus. These are collected in volumes such as **A Good Hanging and Other Stories** and **Beggar's Banquet**. While not essential to the main plot of the novels, these stories provide wonderful character moments and insights into Rebus’s daily life. They are best read after you have finished
