- **Point of Sale System:** Modern dry cleaners need a robust POS system for order tracking, payment processing, and customer

Chemical Solvents and Cleaning Supplies

Your initial inventory of cleaning chemicals and solvents is another often-overlooked component of dry cleaning business start up costs.
