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A NIGHT TO REMEMBER: THE 25TH ANNIVERSARY PHANTOM OF THE OPERA CAST

On the evening of October 1 and 2, 2011, the world of musical theatre stopped to celebrate a monumental milestone. Sierra Boggess as Christine Daaé

Opposite Karimloo was the luminous Sierra Boggess, an American soprano who had also originated the role of Christine in *Love Never Dies*. Boggess is widely regarded as one of the definitive Christines of her generation. Her voice is pure, crystalline, and capable of astonishing power. In the 25th anniversary performance, she brought a youthful innocence and a fierce determination to the role. Her rendition of "Think of Me" was flawless, but it was her breathtaking performance of "The Phantom of the Opera" and "Wishing You Were Somehow Here Again" that truly captivated the audience. The chemistry between Boggess and Karimloo was palpable, a direct result of their extensive work together on the sequel. This familiarity lent their performances an extra layer of depth and tragedy, making the love triangle at the heart of the story more poignant than ever. Boggess was an indispensable pillar of the 25 anniversary Phantom of the Opera cast.

Hadley Fraser as Raoul, Vicomte de Chagny

Completing the central love triangle was British actor Hadley Fraser as Raoul. Fraser was no stranger to this world, having previously played Raoul in the

West End and also appearing alongside Karimloo in *Love Never Dies*. His Raoul was not the one-dimensional "nice guy" often seen in lesser productions. Instead, Fraser portrayed him as a passionate, determined, and deeply caring man, genuinely in love with Christine and willing to fight for her. His rich baritone voice blended beautifully with Boggess's soprano, particularly in their duet "All I Ask of You." The tension between Fraser's confident, handsome Raoul and Karimloo's tormented Phantom was electric, creating a genuinely compelling dramatic conflict. Fraser's strong presence solidified the trio as the emotional core of the 25 anniversary Phantom of the Opera cast.

THE SUPPORTING CAST: BRINGING THE OPERA POPULAIRE TO LIFE

While the leads drove the story, the supporting cast of the 25 anniversary Phantom of the Opera cast provided the color, comedy, and grandeur that make the musical so rich. Every member of the ensemble was a master of their craft.

The Managers and the Prima Donna

The comic relief of the show rests largely on the shoulders of the two new managers of the Opera Populaire, Monsieur Firmin and Monsieur André. In this production:

- **Barry James** played Monsieur Firmin with a perfect blend of bluster and bewilderment. His timing was impeccable, drawing

laughs without ever breaking character.

- **Gareth Snook** portrayed Monsieur André as the more excitable and superstitious of the two managers. His frantic energy was a wonderful counterpoint to James's gruffness.
- **Wendy Ferguson** took on the role of the temperamental prima donna, Carlotta Giudicelli. Her comedic timing was brilliant, and her voice—a powerful, wobbly soprano that turns shrill under pressure—was perfectly suited to the role. Her rendition of "Think of Me" (as Carlotta) was a masterclass in comedic acting.

The Ballet and the Keepers of the Phantom's Secrets

The ballet corps is essential to the visual spectacle of the show, and the 25th anniversary production featured some notable talents:

- **Daisy Maywood** played Meg Giry, the young ballerina who is Christine's friend. Her bright energy and strong dancing were a highlight of the ensemble numbers.
- **Liz Robertson** played Madame Giry, the strict ballet mistress who harbors a secret knowledge of the Phantom. Robertson brought a regal authority and a hint of hidden sorrow to the role, making her more than just a plot device.

- In a special treat, world-renowned ballet star **Sergei Polunin** performed as the lead dancer in the "Hannibal" sequence. His presence added an extraordinary layer of grandeur to the already spectacular production.

THE UNFORGETTABLE ROYAL ALBERT HALL SETTING

It is impossible to discuss the 25 anniversary Phantom of the Opera cast without acknowledging the venue. The Royal Albert Hall is a massive, circular space that presented unique challenges and opportunities for the production. The set design had to be entirely reimaged for this space. Rather than the traditional proscenium arch, the stage was extended out into the audience, and massive, intricate sets were built to occupy the cavernous space. The chandelier, a central symbol of the show, was suspended from the very dome of the hall, and its famous crash was a breathtaking feat of engineering. This grand setting allowed the cast to perform on a scale that was even more epic than the original West End or Broadway productions. The sheer size of the venue amplified the power of the voices and the emotional weight of the performances, making the 25 anniversary Phantom of the Opera cast seem larger than life.

THE GRAND FINALE: A REUNION FOR THE AGES

While the main performance was spectacular, it was the finale that brought the house down. After the curtain call, something magical happened. The stage was filled with past and present cast members from productions around the world. The most

Brightman, who rarely performs the role anymore, then sang "The Phantom of the Opera" with a trio of Phantoms: Ramin Karimloo, and then joined by **Colm Wilkinson** (the original Phantom on the Canadian production and the original Jean Valjean in *Les Misérables*) and **Peter Jöback** (a Swedish star who had played the Phantom many times). This was followed by a medley of "The Music of the Night," with each Phantom taking a verse, culminating in a final, soaring note from Brightman.

Following this, a "Sing-a-long" occurred with the entire audience joining in on the final chorus, with dozens of cast members from around the globe standing on the stage. The finale was a tribute to the global phenomenon that *The Phantom of the Opera* had become. It was a once-in-a-lifetime moment that truly defined the 25 anniversary Phantom of the Opera cast event, celebrating not just one production, but a worldwide community of performers and fans. The appearance of these legends was a powerful reminder of the musical's enduring legacy and its ability to inspire awe across generations.

THE LEGACY OF THE 25TH ANNIVERSARY CAST

The 25th anniversary performance was recorded and released globally in cinemas, on DVD, and on Blu-ray, becoming the best-selling music DVD of the year in several countries. This recording has introduced the magic of the live show to millions of people who

might never have seen it on stage. The 25 anniversary Phantom of the Opera cast is now the definitive cast for a whole generation of fans. Ramin Karimloo and Sierra Boggess, in particular, became the faces of the musical for the 2010s, and their performances in this production are often cited as the gold standard for the roles.

The event also cemented the Royal Albert Hall as a major venue for large-scale musical theatre productions. The success of this *Phantom* paved the way for similar gala performances of other musicals, such as *Miss Saigon* and *Les Misérables*, creating a new tradition for the West End.
