Requirement 1: Show Your Camping Gear

- **Answer Approach:** Create a personal gear list organized by categories: clothing (layers, rain gear, boots), shelter (tent, footprint, stakes), sleep system (sleeping bag, pad, pillow), cooking (stove, fuel, pot, spoon), hydration (water

bottles or filtration), tools (knife, flashlight, multi-tool), and comfort (camp chair, camp shoes). For each item, write one sentence on its purpose. Requirement 2: Camping Safety and First Aid

Worksheet Question: "List safety rules for cooking, fire building, and using tools at camp."

- **Answer Key:** For cooking: always supervise a stove, keep flammable materials away, never cook inside a tent. For fire building: clear a 10-foot area of debris, have water and a shovel nearby, never leave a fire unattended. For tools: always establish a "blood circle" when using a knife or axe, carry a closed knife in your pocket, use a sheath on axes, and cut away from your body. These are essential rules that every scout must internalize. Your worksheet should list at least three distinct rules for each category.

Worksheet Question: "Explain what to do if a person is showing signs of hypothermia or heat exhaustion."

- **Answer:** For hypothermia (shivering, confusion, drowsiness): get the person into a warm environment, remove wet clothing, wrap in blankets or a sleeping bag, offer warm (not hot) sweet drinks, and monitor breathing. For heat exhaustion (heavy sweating, weakness, cold/pale skin): move to a cool place, loosen clothing, apply cool wet cloths, sip cool water, and seek medical help if vomiting or symptoms worsen. These answers align with BSA and Red Cross guidelines.

Requirement 3: Leave No Trace Principles

Worksheet Question: "Describe the seven Leave No Trace principles and give an example of how you will practice each on a campout."

1. **Plan Ahead and Prepare:** Check weather, pack food in reusable containers to minimize waste.
2. **Travel and Camp on Durable Surfaces:** Set up tent on designated pads or bare ground, avoid trampling vegetation.
3. **Dispose of Waste Properly:** Pack out all trash, use a portable toilet or dig a cat hole at least 200 feet from water.
4. **Leave What You Find:** Do not pick flowers, collect rocks, or move natural objects.
5. **Minimize Campfire Impacts:** Use a camp stove for cooking, only build fires in established fire rings, keep fires

small.

6. **Respect Wildlife:** Store food in bear-proof containers or hang it away from camp, observe animals from a distance.
7. **Be Considerate of Other Visitors:** Keep noise low, yield on trails, respect privacy.

Your worksheet answers should show that you can apply each principle to a real campsite situation.

Requirement 4: Camping Skills – Tying Knots and Setting Up Tent

Worksheet Question: "Demonstrate how to tie a square knot, two half-hitches, and a taut-line hitch. Explain their uses."

- **Answers:**
 - **Square knot:** Used to join two ropes of equal thickness, such as tying a bandage or securing a bundle. Ensure it is tied correctly to avoid slipping.
 - **Two half-hitches:** Quick way to attach a rope to a post or tree. Often used for a clothesline or to secure a tent guyline to a stake.
 - **Taut-line hitch:** An adjustable knot that can be slid to tighten or loosen a rope. Ideal for tent guylines to maintain tension as weather changes.

Worksheet Question: "Explain how to choose a good campsite."

- **Answer:** Look for a flat, level area at least 200 feet from water sources. Avoid low spots that could collect rain, keep away from dead trees or hanging branches, face the tent entrance away from the wind, and check for signs of animal activity. Also consider sun exposure – some shade is welcome but too much can be damp. Your answer should show that you evaluate both comfort and safety.

Requirement 5: Cooking at Camp

Worksheet Question: "Plan a menu for a weekend campout. Include breakfast, lunch, dinner, and snacks. List the ingredients and cooking method."

- **Sample Answer:** Day 1 dinner – foil packet meals (chicken, potatoes, carrots, wrapped in foil and cooked on coals or stove); Day 2 breakfast – oatmeal with berries and milk (boil water, add oatmeal, stir). For lunch – tortilla wraps with peanut butter and honey (no cooking required). Snacks – trail mix, granola bars. This answer should demonstrate an understanding of nutrition, meal prep, simplicity, and cleanup.

Worksheet Question: "Explain how to store food safely at camp to avoid attracting animals."

- **Answer:** Store all food, trash, and scented items (toothpaste, soap) in a bear bag or bear canister. Hang the bag 10 feet up and 4 feet away from the tree trunk, at night and when not in use. Never keep food inside the tent. Clean dishes immediately and store grey water in a sealed container.

Requirement 6: Map and Compass

Worksheet Question: "Describe how to orient a map using a compass. What is the difference between magnetic north and grid north?"

- **Answer:** To orient a map, set the compass's direction of travel arrow pointing away from you, rotate the bezel so that north on the compass aligns with north on the map, then turn your body until the magnetic needle matches the orienting arrow. Magnetic north shifts over time while grid north is fixed on map projections. In the field, we adjust for declination – the angle between magnetic north and true north. This knowledge is critical for navigation.

Requirement 7: Weather Awareness

Worksheet Question: "List four signs of approaching bad weather. What should you do if a storm hits while you are in camp?"

- **Answer:** Signs: darkening skies, sudden drop in temperature, increasing wind, distant thunder. If a storm hits: move away from tall objects and water, avoid open areas, crouch low on the balls of your feet in a lightning-safe position (tuck head, hands on knees). Do not stay under a tarp if it is metal. If in a tent, stay away from the poles. These answers show preparedness.

Requirement 8: First Aid Kit

Worksheet Question: "Prepare a personal first aid kit for a weekend campout. List its contents."

- **Answer:** A well-stocked kit includes adhesive bandages (various sizes), antiseptic wipes, blister treatment, gauze pads, medical tape, tweezers, pain relievers, antihistamine, instant ice pack, gloves, CPR mask, and a small emergency blanket. Also include personal medications. Explain where you will store it (always in daypack or pocket).

Requirement 9: Camping Etiquette and Regulations

Worksheet Question: "Explain the permit requirements for camping on public land (Forest Service, National Park, state parks)."

- **Answer:** Many areas require a backcountry permit for overnight stays, especially in wilderness zones. Some have group size limits, campfire restrictions, and designated campsites. Always check with the local ranger station before your trip. Fire permits may be needed during dry seasons. Example: In a National Forest, you may need a free self-issued permit at the trailhead, while in a National Park sometimes a paid reservation is needed.

Requirement 10: Planning and Leading a Campout

Worksheet Question: "Create a schedule for a two-night campout. Include arrival, activities, meals, and departure times."

- **Answer Outline:** Day 1 – Arrive at 2 PM, set up camp, 3:30 PM knot practice, 5 PM start fire/cook dinner, 7 PM campfire program, 9 PM lights out. Day 2 – 7 AM breakfast, 8:30 AM hike (3 miles), 12 PM lunch, 1 PM waterfront/swimming, 4 PM camp craft, 6 PM dinner, 8 PM night hike. Day 3 – 7 AM

breakfast, 8 AM break camp, 10 AM departure. This shows you can manage time and ensure all requirements are met.
