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# Diet For Rh Negative Blood Type

## Fruits: Low Glycemic and High Antioxidant

## Grains and Legumes: Choose Wisely

# Healthy Fats: Essential for Hormones and Cell Membranes

Healthy fats are crucial for Rh negative individuals because they support cell integrity and reduce inflammation. Olive oil, coconut oil, avocado oil, flaxseed oil, and ghee (if dairy is tolerated) are excellent sources. Nuts and seeds — such as walnuts, almonds, pumpkin seeds, and chia seeds — provide essential fatty acids and minerals. However, peanuts and cashews are sometimes limited due to higher lectin content. If you enjoy nut butters, choose almond or sunflower seed butter instead of peanut butter.
